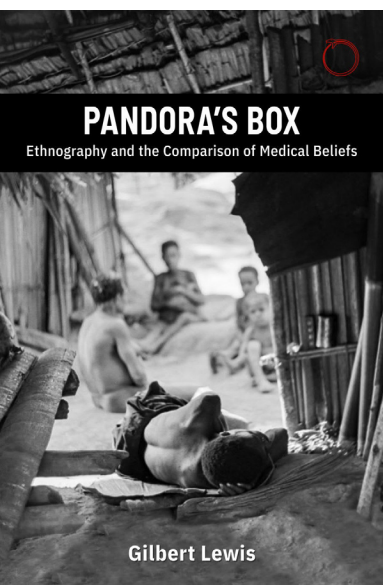

The book, a culmination of lifetime exploration in the field medical anthropology written between 1979 and 2020, raises critical questions regarding how medical practice have been influenced and shaped through cultural beliefs.

Conceptualizing the practices in contemporary context, Gilbert Lewis analyses how western culture can learn from non-Western societies that

consider sickness and curing to be as much a matter of social relationships as biological states and what problems arise when one set of therapeutic practices displaces another.

Culture drives human evolution more than genetics

Tim Waring and Zach Wood found that culture helps humans to adapt to their environment and overcome challenges better and faster than genetics in their extensive literature review. They concluded that humans are experiencing a “special evolutionary transition” in which cultural attributes like learned knowledge, practices, and skills surpass the value of genes in the process of evolution. They further state “Take the coronavirus pandemic, for example. An effective national epidemic response program is truly a national immune system, and we can therefore learn directly from how immune systems work to improve our COVID response.”

From Impurity to Purity

Carrying the historical significance, Kamakhya temple is situated in the land of Guwahati (Assam). The temple is famous as one of the Shakti peetha of goddess Shakti and her genitals are the object of worship here.

There are several temples in India where women entry is restricted, considering menstruation as impure to women (Sabrimala temple in Kerala). While every June, the Kamakhya temple hosts the Ambubachi Mela (fair). The temple remains close for three days as it is believed that the Goddess menstruates during this time.

Women pray for their fertility and celebrate their childbearing capabilities. Tantrics and sadhus, who usually avoid public appearances, visit this temple during this event. On the fourth day of Ambubachi Mela, temple doors open for the public, and everyone looks forward to receiving a piece of cloth soaked in the Goddess's menstrual fluid.

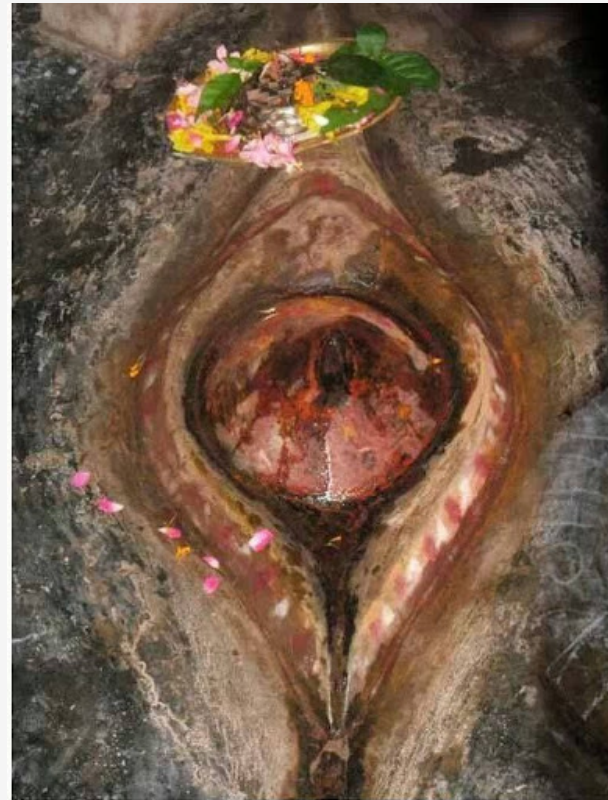
This faith and cultural practices make this fair unique and bring the idea of purity from impurity.
